Every Student Succeeds Act

On December 10, 2015, the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) was signed by President Obama. This reauthorization of the elementary and Secondary Education Act, formerly known as No Child Left Behind, provides a long-term, stable federal policy that gives states additional flexibility and encourages states, local school systems, and schools to innovate while at the same time holding all accountable for results. The plan aligns with Maryland's long-range education priorities and goals designed to produce graduates who are college-and career ready.

Meeting our Goals

In order to meet these goals and comply with the requirements set forth in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), Maryland will impart long-term goals and annual measurements of interim progress in three areas: academic achievement based on a performance composite, graduation rate, and progress toward English language.

Garrett County Schools Title I Complaint Procedures

If an individual or an organization believes that the federal Title I regulations are not being followed, an individual or organization has the right to file a written complaint to the Superintendent of the Garrett County Public Schools.

The Written complaint shall include:

- A statement that the public agency has violated a requirement in the federal Title I regulations
- The facts upon which statement is based

This must include any documentation supporting the allegation(s). Complaints must be filed within one (1) year of the date that the alleged violation occurred, unless a longer period is reasonable because the violation is continuing. The Garrett County Public Schools is to investigate and issue its findings within 60 calendar days of receipt of the written complaint. The GCPS may permit an extension of the 60 day timeline only if exceptional circumstances exist regarding a particular complaint. Title I Schools' Parental Rights

Under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), parents whose children attend Title I schools have certain rights. This brochure will attempt to explain those rights for you.

You have the right to:

- Know the professional qualifications of the classroom and specialist teachers who instruct your child.
- Know whether Instructional Assistants
 provide services to your child and, if they do,
 their qualifications.
- 3) In the event that there is a need for a long term sub, notification shall be made to parents within the week of placement, along with their qualifications.

About the Title I Program

Title I is a federal program designed to provide support to students, Pre-K to 5th grade, in areas of Reading and math. This is supplemental funding made available to qualifying schools according to Free and Reduced Meal (FaRMs) eligibility. The Title I mission is to have parents, families, educators, and community members working together as partners, sharing the accountability and desire to improve the achievement of all students.

Each school develops, with parent input, the Home/ School Compact. It outlines expectations for teachers, parents, and students in order to focus on

increasing the academic achievement of all students. Teachers review the compact with students and parents during the school year.



Garrett County Public Schools regard parents as important team members. Research has shown that academic success is positively impacted when parents become involved in their child's education. All Title I schools implement the Garrett County Public Schools Parent Involvement Policy. In addition, each school develops, with parent input, a Parent Involvement Plan.

Parent Involvement

Parents have the right to be involved in deciding how Title I funds are allocated at the district and school level.

Title I funds are reserved to support children experiencing homelessness. Garrett County Public Schools has a process for using these funds to assist homeless families.

Title I schools are required to annually revise their School Improvement Plan (SIP). Parents and representatives of the community are encouraged to participate, and/or offer feedback on the finished SIP.
